## ALEX WILLIS-BRAY

One day you can be on the phone to the New York mafia and the next filming with Jamie Oliver at his house.

Our newest Alumni Representative Alex Willis-Bray (1998), tells us about life as a TV Production Executive and Presenter on shows like Jamie Oliver's Dream School and The Apprentice, and shares how her time at Harrogate Ladies' College taught her that there was life out in the world that needs to be explored.

Joining the school in the early 90s in Upper 3, Alex went right through her senior school years as a boarder at Harrogate Ladies' College.

'I loved my time at school.
It pushed me to succeed.
The community, that
feeling of belonging and
most of all, the friendships
I made are still really
important to me.'

Despite being local to the area, Alex was a full-time boarder "we got up to all sorts of things" she laughs "but I won't mention that right now! I just remember feeling really lucky to spend so much time with the girls, hanging out, supporting each other and generally going through teenage life together. It was a really happy time spent in the 'horse boxes' (now the Prefect study rooms), with High Teas, school trips and the choir – everything that makes HLC what it is.

It was my time at school that set me up for the next stage of my life – it gave me more confidence, gave me that drive to try new things and showed me there was a life out there to explore. Even the art trip to London gave me an insight into the capital city that helped me several years later when I headed down there for an interview."



And it wasn't just the skills she learnt at school that helped her in her career, even the lacrosse team's reputation played a part "I had an interview for my first production job in London at a big TV production company, and the lady who interviewed me had been to Queen Ethelburgas. She remembered playing us at lacrosse and said she knew just the kind of girl that went to HLC. She offered me the job right there and then!"

During her time at school, Alex had always leaned towards the creative side of things and particularly loved art. This led her to a career in graphic and web design. But, when the .com bubble burst, she knew she needed to think carefully about a new career. It was during a trip to York St John University where she spotted the TV and Film degree that would lead her to a career working on programmes such as 'Coronavirus: When Will Lockdown End' and 'Our Baby: A Modern Miracle'. "I got really excited about the Film & Television course and really enjoyed it, TV sounded so glamourous (in reality, it's not!)" she laughs.

"I was a mature student by this point and I think that actually helped me secure some of my earlier roles in television. It was also sheer determination and pure perseverance, skills I'd learned at school, that helped me to keep chasing my dream. I was constantly contacting and writing to production companies, I just didn't give up. I eventually got a call from a

production company for a football drama and went down to London for the first time since the art trip. I was on my way home after the interview and I got a call to say I'd got the job and I started tomorrow! I had to pack my bag and say goodbye to my family in one evening and then I was off to start a new life in London the next day. It was crazy but I just cracked on with it."

Alex wears two hats in her role in television. As well as being in front of the camera in presenting roles, she also works on the production side of things, managing all aspects of a production and driving it forwards in order to deliver the finished article to the channel. "The production team facilitate making the programme so anything from hiring crew, setting up global shoots, budgets, health and safety, music, legal, liaising with talent and commissioners, whatever it takes to make it work. It taps into my creative side because I can visualise where the editorial team are coming from and can predict what will happen next with the show so can mitigate issues. The whole production is like a pattern in my mind and that really appeals to me.

'I love the variety. It can be stressful but it's fun.'

One day you can be on the phone to the New York Mafia and the next thing you're filming with Jamie Oliver at his house. You meet so many different people from around the world, you're put in a position where you have to work as a team with people you've never met before, and you work together to make a programme seen by millions around the globe. It gives you such a sense of achievement, especially with the factual programmes I tend to work on, as it means we can tell someone's story or provide information that could educate or even help people around the world."

I get the same buzz from presenting, especially as I do a lot of live television and I get to focus on fashion, which is a real passion of mine." And what is the hope now for the next phase of her career?

"I'd love to do more presenting in and around Yorkshire, and that's not just because we've moved back here. I'm proud to be from Yorkshire!".

Since her recent move back to Yorkshire, Alex has taken up the Alumni Representative role for Leeds and Bradford.

'It still feels like I'm going 'back to school' when I take part in events as an Alumni Rep but it also feels like I'm looking at what happens in school from a different angle. Knowing I'm there to help others and support the younger generation to come through is a great privilege.'





# HIGHLIGHTS

It has been a busy year with lots to celebrate across the school.

At the beginning of the last school year we were delighted to be the only girls' school in the North of England chosen as a finalist in the Independent School of the Year Award.

Autumn last year, College boarder, Elizabeth-Rose Sandhu, age 17, penned a poem inspired by her love of nature, to win an award at a local Literary Festival. Elizabeth-Rose said she was thrilled to win the Young Writers' Competition. The Sixth Form pupil hopes to study English Literature at Edinburgh University and one day dreams of becoming a head teacher. Her passion for the subject was sparked by teachers at Harrogate Ladies' College who helped develop her love of Sylvia Plath and the Bronte sisters.

In November we underwent a comprehensive review by the Independent Schools Inspectorate – the equivalent of Ofsted in the state sector. Their report highlighted the work of staff in fulfilling the school's values and individual achievements of pupils in academic and personal development. The report also recognised the quality of academic study by pupils as well as the 'personal, moral, social and cultural development of pupils', and the standards of practice put in place for the welfare, health and safety of pupils.

At the beginning of 2022 Sophie Dragoj received the Rotary Club of Harrogate Young Citizen Award for her effort in school and the local community. Sophie, our very own Charity Prefect said she was thrilled to receive her prize from School Principal, Mrs Sylvia Brett.

She was nominated for her efforts with local and national appeals including the MacMillan Coffee Morning, the Harvest Appeal for Harrogate Homeless Project, the Poppy Appeal and the national Anti-Bullying Week.



In the spring, pupils working towards their bronze, silver and gold Duke of Edinburgh award, set off across the North Yorkshire Moors for the expedition element of the programme. All of the groups did exceptionally well and thankfully the weather was kind for their assessment.



In June, we welcomed a former Olympic athlete to school to speak at the College Sports Presentation evening, which recognises the sporting achievements and efforts of pupils at the school. Swimmer, Chris Cook, told the audience of parents and pupils that he was an ordinary man who had achieved extraordinary feats because of self-belief, hard work and resilience. He said the ability to fail and bounce back from failures was the most important lesson in life

Chris swam for Great Britain in the Olympics, world championships, European championships and competed for England in the Commonwealth Games. He started his swimming career in his home town of South Shields in the North East and now runs a swimming academy for over 1,000 children.

In the summer term, the modern-day complexities of a 'real' murder scene were brought to life in a day of serious scientific investigation for pupils. The girls had to investigate the suspicious 'death' of a 'body' as part of their Crime Scene Investigation Day, which was attended by a forensics officer from North Yorkshire Police. The project included studying hair and blood samples, finger printing, testing fabrics under a microscope, and looking at the science behind aunshot residue. The day, run by the school's Science department, began with the 'discovery' of the 'victim's' body and led to detailed research in a makeshift mortuary.

Head of Science at the school, Sue Ali, said the day was designed to bring science to life and encourage more girls to think about STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) in future. The day was aided by STEM ambassadors who are sixth-form students from the school who are studying Science subjects. They were also given a talk on careers in forensics and the opportunities in police and detective work.






We were privileged to welcome the renowned artist, Tom Wood, to run workshops with Lower 5 and Lower 6 pupils. Tom, who has been commissioned to paint portraits of HRH King Charles III and Alan Bennet, to name a few, shared exciting techniques and tips which inspired our budding artists

Pupils celebrated an excellent set of A level results which include impressive grades in Sciences and Maths. Pupils at the school achieved top results across all subjects with 69 per cent of all grades at A\*-B level; 42% at A\*-A and 22% at the highest A\* grade, including 100% of Further Maths grades.

Girls also celebrated the highest number of top GCSE grades since the new grading system came into place five years ago. The number of top 9-7 grades (equivalent of A\*\*-A previously), increased to 64 per cent, with 24% of all grades at the highest possible grade 9. There were successes across a wide range of subjects with six separate subjects achieving a clean sweep of 9-7 grades.

It was an honour Dr Emily Lawson DBE, Head of the Delivery Unit at 10 Downing Street, previously worked at NHS England and Improvement where she was National Director for the NHS Covid-19 vaccine deployment programme. She led the operational delivery of the vaccine across the NHS in England from its inception and returned to the role to lead the booster programme

The theme of this year's Speech Day at the school was 'Building Forward Together' which reflects the school's decisive response to the pandemic two years ago and its determination to lead the way in girls' education moving forward.

Dame Emily told the audience that her role was to ensure the vaccine rolled out in line with the Joint Committee for Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) advice and in a way that ensured fair and equitable access, maximising uptake across all communities.

A Molecular Geneticist by background, Emily has led a number of large-scale organisational change programmes. She was Chief People Officer at Kingfisher plc, and worked at Morrisons and McKinsey. She was a founding member and has also been Deputy Chair of the 30% Club, which aims to increase representation of women on UK plc boards, and to research and support greater diversity in the UK and global institutions.

As well as hearing from Dame Emily we heard from all of our outgoing prefects and bid them farewell as they took their first steps in the next part of their journeys and became the newest members of the alumni community.

## SIXTH FORM SCHOLARSHIP

Our existing scholarship and bursary programme is integral to our school, enabling young women with potential and ambition to have every possible opportunity to excel. And, in turn, these young women bring so much to our school community. However, over recent years, the number of requests for financial support has increased.



So, in a first for the school, we asked friends and our alumni community to come together to help fund a new scholarship for our sixth form to enable a day girl from the local area to attend Harrogate Ladies' College, at a critical time, as she studies for her A levels.

The scholarship aims to remove all the barriers that stand in the way of an exceptional girl from a local, low-income family attending the College. As ever, the HCU Community has been incredibly supportive and through your generosity we have already raised over £5,000 of our £40,000 target – thank you so very much.

With £35,000 still to raise to achieve our target for the 1893 Scholarship, your support could be critical in enabling us to change one young person's life.

## SCHOLARSHIP NAME REVEALED

As well as the alumni community giving so generously, many of you also took the time to vote for the name of the new scholarship. The Swinton Scholarship, suggested in recognition of the generous act of Lord Swinton when he offered up his home to house the school during WW2, and the 1893 Scholarship, in reference to our founding year as one of the leading schools in women's education, were the two main options.

It was a very close-run thing, with almost identical numbers of votes for both Swinton and 1893. So, we have come up with a solution that brings both of these wonderful ideas together.

The Small Hall will be named The Swinton Theatre. And the Sixth Form scholarship will be known as the 1893 Scholarship.

Thank you to everyone who has given to the school and to everyone who took the time to place their vote.

#### **SUPPORTING UKRAINE**

Like much of the world, we have seen the impact of the crisis in Ukraine. Here at Harrogate Ladies' College we are supporting 3 young people from Ukraine to ensure they're able to continue their education with best possible support.

We're incredibly grateful to the HCU Executive Committee for so generously supporting one our pupils. Ksenia. Ksenia is 12 years old and has fled the war with her mother. Her father and two brothers have had to stay behind. She and her mother are being hosted by a local family in Knaresborough and whilst the school is covering all of the fees for her attending school, the gift from the HCU Executive will enable Ksenia to enjoy extra-curricular activities. She is a very talented musician and won an international music competition. and has already joined the choir, so this special donation will fund Ksenia's music lessons for the year and ensure she can continue to enjoy her passions.

Over the past 12 months we have met with 111 old girls. You have attended events, shared your expertise to inspire our current pupils, taken the time to be interviewed to raise the profile of our wonderful alumni community. 150 alumni also took the time to

respond to our Alumni Survey in order to help us forge the next phase of activity for the HCU members.

In addition, there have been countless responses to newsletters, well-wishes for current pupils, kind words and the sharing of school memories.

# TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

Author, local historian and member of the Civic Society, Dr Paul Jennings, gave a talk at this year's HCU Reunion. The response was so positive, Dr Jennings kindly wrote this article outlining the school's early years.

The school dates from 1893 when it began as an offshoot of Harrogate College, a boys' school in Ripon Road, then under the headship of George Savery. After a succession of premises, Savery built the new school on land behind the original school, completed in 1904, with a new wing added within just three years. Sadly, Savery died soon after, the boys' college subsequently closed and the girls' school now took the name Harrogate College.



From 1898, the head was Miss Jones, formerly of Bradford Girls' Grammar School. In an address to the girls in 1906, she outlined the school's ethos. First, education was not about facts. As she expressed it, 'the only thing that really matters in education is the training of the mental faculties, and any subject which improves your powers of concentration, observation, reflection, and reason for you is a valuable subject'.

The school was part of a great expansion of schooling for the daughters of the middle classes. But whilst she believed passionately in their right to an education just like their brothers, and for some it would form the path to a career, she made it clear also that for most it would make them better people but more particularly better wives and mothers. As she put it.

'The homes of England will be all the happier when presided over by a greater number of thoughtful, intelligent and liberally educated women.'



To achieve this end, they received a broad and stimulating education from highly qualified staff. In addition to the usual subjects, science and art were studied. The learning of languages was encouraged, with French- and Germanborn teachers at the school. Further, for the older girls, a house was taken near Paris, the Maison Blanche, where they would speak the language and enjoy the city's culture.



#### **ALUMNI**



After it was forced to close due to the First World War, a house at the school was similarly used. There was intellectual stimulus too in a range of societies and out-of-school activities. The Debating Society was very active, with subjects such as whether women should dress for comfort. fashion or art (art won) or whether monarchy was preferable to a republic (it was) or whether girls had a better time than boys (they didn't). The Dramatic Society was also active, including a performance, in French, of Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme. There were visiting lecturers and the older girls attended those offered in the town by the Literary Society or the University Extension Movement. like those of Professor Grant on the French Revolution. And there were excursions to local places of interest like Fountains

Abbey, but also more informally, one to Birstwith, for example, with Mr and Mrs Savery in the summer of 1899, including boating on the river for which, the school magazine reported, three of the College boys 'kindly came to take charge of the boats'.



Domestic skills were always encouraged. To this end, in 1911 Clarence House was equipped for girls to learn cooking, housewifery, laundry, needlework and dressmaking, and the general management of a home. including the arrangement of the servants' duties. Sport was also very much a part of school life, with hockey, cricket, tennis, lacrosse, athletics, cycling and swimming at the Starbeck pool. There were matches with other local private girls' schools, as the hockey team, for example, in 1900-01. played Dunorlan, Harrogate, Bradford Girls' Grammar School, Harrogate, Ripon and Horsforth Ladies teams.



The duty to think of others less fortunate was stressed. The school maintained, for example, a 'native day school' at Jaffna, in then Ceylon. In 1911, girls made several visits to the recently opened Home for Crippled Children in Tewit Well Road and a Christmas Party was put on for the children at the school.

In those Edwardian years, the school had some 150 girls boarding. They lived in the school itself or in the houses which the school purchased in Clarence Drive.

An admissions register, beginning in 1903, shows who they were. They were the daughters of industrialists, merchants, and professional men, including many clergymen: the vicar of Christ Church, Harrogate, for example, sent his daughters to the school. They came largely from the north of England. Where the girls went after school is less easy to examine. The inclusion of marriages and births in the magazine suggests that many did indeed take up the roles Miss Jones envisaged. But others did go on to university and pursue careers, usually in teaching.

Several girls went on to Newnham College, Cambridge. Norah Manson, the daughter of a Manchester accountant, read medieval and modern languages and pursued such a career. Faith Bagenal, the daughter of a Dublin civil servant, took a degree in economics and became active in the suffrage movement, on which she read a paper at an Old Girls' Reunion. She later became Lady Henderson and no subsequent career is noted in the College records.

Of course, the school magazines and formal records can only tell us so much. The former naturally record the successes. It would be nice to hear the voices of those Edwardian girls and what they thought of their experience.





We are delighted to introduce Niamh, our very first Alumni Prefect.

Niamh will be working closely with the Alumni & Development Manager, to help raise awareness of the amazing alumni community, encouraging leavers to join, thus ensuring the long term future of the HCU. "The American Thyroid Association (ATA) have established the Valerie Anne Galton Distinguished Lectureship Award in recognition of Valerie Anne Galton, PhD, professor emerita of physiology and neurobiology at Geisel School of Medicine, for her remarkable scientific accomplishments and significant contributions to the advancement of clinical knowledge of thyroid conditions. This is the first ATA lectureship named in honor of a woman."

second year. She has also taken up the role of Charity & Events Secretary for the lacrosse club.








